# Schumer Reveals: Upstate NY Air Traffic Controller Shortage Growing – Towers Already 25 Percent Understaffed

With air service on the rise in communities across upstate New York, U.S. Senator Charles E. Schumer revealed that there are potentially 25 percent fewer air traffic controllers watching the skies over New York this year than there should be. Schumer will say that, with air service growing, fewer controllers watching more flights could lead to delays, close calls, and even disaster. One of the primary reasons for this shortage is the growing number of air traffic controllers who are retiring. In the past, between 1 and 2 % of the controller workforce became eligible for retirement each year, that number will reach 10 percent in 2007. In just the last week, 100 air traffic controllers across the country have already retired.

According to the National Air Traffic Controllers Association, in upstate New York, there are currently only 164 controllers watching the skies, including in-house trainees and controllers on medical leave, instead of the 192 authorized by the FAA.
